A Message from Mer and Basheer

CO-FOUNDERS OF AMAL-TIKVA

Israelis and Palestinians are hurting right now more than ever, and those of us trying to create a more peaceful reality are no exception. Each of us continues to feel the trauma of October 7th everyday. For me, Meredith, having my husband called for reserve duty has made my day-to-day more difficult and overwhelming. For me, Basheer, as a Palestinian citizen of Israel raising a family in Jerusalem, I have to balance staying focused on work and keeping my family safe.

Some participants in our ecosystem have staff or volunteers who are missing or murdered, while others are indefinitely drafted. Some are traumatized beyond being able to function, while others have had their bank accounts shut down, their homes or offices destroyed. Many have had no direct contact with the violence and yet are paralyzed by the anxiety and fear of it all, while others are working around the clock on adrenaline.

This moment seems to have changed almost everything, but what has not changed is our goal: building capacity for sustainable and scalable peacebuilding.

At Amal-Tikva we seek to build capacity for sustainable and scalable peacebuilding between Israelis and Palestinians. Right now that means making sure there are solid people dedicated to this work now and when the war is over. We are doubling down, committed as we have always been, to supporting NGOs, donors, activists, academics and decision-makers -- anyone committed to building a more peaceful reality.

About Amal-Tikva

Amal-Tikva seeks to build capacity for sustainable and scalable peacebuilding between Israelis and Palestinians. We know that the shortcomings of peacebuilding efforts have many roots, so we offer a comprehensive range of programs to ensure that all stakeholders are equipped to lay the foundation for a better reality. We are committed to working top down, bottom up, and side to side as long as participants seek to be real, strategic, and committed to impact.

Since our founding in 2019, we have been working mostly at the NGO and academic levels to support developing evidence-based theories of change rooted in strategic thinking. We believe that these theories of change, if integrated with high level management and operations, could provide the field of peacebuilding the opportunity to have impact at scale.

We have served dozens of NGOs through Fieldbuilding360, our flagship program, and we are seeing through these NGOs growth and success that our method is working. Yet, while the Fieldbuilding360 program continues to grow and focus on each NGO's internal capacity, we have learned that supporting NGOs as entities only works so well without also investing in their leadership to have the support they need to scale their impact. This is where our human capital programs come in through the Amal-Tikva Leadership Institute and Embodying Peace.

At the same time, NGO success, even with the most exceptional leaders, are limited by international discourse on the conflict which affects funding and high level political engagement. We know that our efforts and those of our participants have to be heard around the world, to demonstrate to decision makers, experts, and donors that a more peaceful reality is possible and imperative.





Our Theory of Change for the field:

If a critical mass of Israelis and Palestinians at all levels and across all sectors of their societies:

- develop a positive perception of the other,
- see themselves as agents of change
- develop a sense of shared interest,
- and have channels for taking action;

and if sufficient capacity exists, such as

- funds,
- infrastructure,
- mechanisms for bridging research with best practices,
- international support

Then that critical mass of Israelis and Palestinians will hope for, believe in, and work toward building a sustainable more peaceful reality,

and then the cycle of violence and tension will be replaced by a sense of partnership rooted in mutual interest, leading to the conflict feeling:

- less intractable,
- actually solvable, and
- worthy of political capital being deployed toward peace at all levels.

Ofor our role in the field:

If NGOs, donors, experts, academics and activists work strategically and collaboratively as one field:

- sharing a common language
- operating and using resources effectively
- measuring and evaluating their work to ensure maximum impact;

Then the Israeli-Palestinian conflict will feel more resolvable and less zerosum in nature to key and relevant stakeholders, which is a critical first step toward building a just and lasting peace defined by:

- less hatred, tension and violence
- increased quality of life
- improved systems of interaction.

Fieldbuilding360

Fieldbuilding360 convenes, supports, and builds capacity for peacebuilding organizations to work more effectively, strategically, and in coordination with one another.

Since 2020, we have supported 26 NGOs through this program, 8 of whom joined us in 2023. We see each team become more focused, strategic and primed for impact than they ever imagined--rooted in a strong theory of change and with the operational management tools and skills to be sustainable.

- 8 new NGOs in 2023
- 26 total engaged NGOs
- 11 Israeli led NGOs, 7 Palestinian led NGOs
- 6 co-led NGOs, 2 foreign led NGOs
- 19 operate in a cross-border capacity

• Fieldbuilding 2.0

Amal Tikva recognizes that not all challenges can be addressed at once. Organizational change takes time. This is why we offer FB2.0, targeted support for our NGO alumni focusing on real-time issues such as program design, financial management, fundraising, hiring/firing, and of course monitoring and evaluation. In 2023 we ran 15 cycles for 12 NGOs.

Ecosystem

The Amal-Tikva ecosystem is where all of our program participants come together. This network creates space to share lessons learned and complement each other's theories of change.

In 2023, we hosted 5 seminars such as: how to write an annual report, how to work with new funding opportunities and even the benefits of ChatGPT for nonprofits. Unfortunately, our 2023 annual summit was canceled due to the war.

We helped facilitate the B8 of Hope Synergies Lab's second year, where four out of seven partnerships received continued funding and consultation.



Amal-Tikva Leadership Institute

Peacebuilding efforts need innovative and collaborative leadership who feel supported, inspired and committed. ATLI provides this by:

- Equipping leaders with knowledge and skills needed to make real impact.
- Building cohorts of peers who will support one another over the long term.
- Introducing innovative approaches to social change

ATLI - Emerging Leaders

The Emerging Leaders group meets weekly for a hybrid program on comparative conflict, strategic planning and creative program design, as well as weekend seminars for storytelling and dialogue, and ending with a study tour to Belfast, Northern Ireland. The 2023 cohort hosted 15 Israeli and Palestinian young professionals:

- 91% feel they have built a professional community of peers
- 78% gained new professional methods and tools to support their work

ATLI - Executive Program

After Oct 7 we immediately launched a director's forum to allow space to share the challenges of leading teams doing peacebuilding in a time of war.

This forum highlighted the need for holistic support through mentorship, professional development, uni-national venting, and peer-to-peer troubleshooting and dialogue.

We are transitioning the 2023 directors forum into a more formal executive program. The first cohort will formally begin in February 2024 with 12 participants.



Once in a while, activists approach us looking to build a new initiative. Occasionally a donor will offer to fund a new concept, seeking a leader.

In 2023 we realized it's time for an incubator to build new initiatives.

The field needs new ideas, and new ideas need strategic plans, effective operations and a bit of funding to get started. We are offering this now to our first participant, and look forward to investing in at least three more this year.



Embodying Peace

Embodying Peace was first conceptualized to engage international college students through education and internships in the peacebuilding field. After several Israeli and Palestinian Embodying Peace alumni chose a career in peacebuilding as a direct result of the program, we realized we were onto something. In 2023 we pivoted Embodying Peace to focus on bringing in new young professionals into the field by:

- Educating Israelis, Palestinians and internationals about the complexity of the conflict,
- Teaching them methods and tools to hold that complexity in their day-to-day lives,
- Providing opportunities to learn and practice project development and implementation,
- Building a resilient community for those seeking to work and volunteer in the field.

Our 2023 in-person pilot ran for 4 months, including 12 participants meeting over 14 sessions, two trips, and including internships with organizations on the ground. Nine of the alumni are now working in the field in the following capacities:

- 5 alumni in entry-level roles in organizations in the field,
- 2 alumni created roles for themselves as guides and artists serving the field,
- 1 alumna is participating in additional peacebuilding programs
- 1 alumnus is a new CEO

International Education

In 2023 as we continued to receive invitations to speak or testify as experts on Israeli-Palestinian peacebuilding efforts. Working closely with partners such as ALLMEP, the United States Institute of Peace, the S. Daniel Abraham Center for Middle East Peace and the Israel Policy Forum, we had the opportunity to share what we are seeing as trends on the ground with USAID's MEPPA team as well as other foreign and local policy and decision makers from around the world.

B8 of Hope -

Grant Management and Synergies Lab

In 2023 we launched a partnership with B8 of Hope, a Swiss registered non-profit association promoting peace-building and transformative grassroots initiatives within both Palestinian and Israeli civil societies by offering visibility, funding, networking and capacity-building opportunities. After working together on several smaller projects over the last few years, B8 of Hope has contracted us to manage the capacity building, convening and application and reporting processes for all of their grantees.




What is "PEACE" anyway ?!


